I grew up in a rustic family with average schooling. I was the oldest of the siblings, so many uncalled responsibilities overburdened my young shoulders. It was an unasked call to do better and set an example for the coming generation. I wanted to uplift my family, so I decided to sit for the All-India Entrance Examination of Jamia Hamdard, and I luckily cracked it with an ace. I struggled with the dialectal hitches, yet I managed to train and groom myself in pharmaceutical science, and a new chapter of my life started. It wasn't easy to adjust

I graduated with a Bachelor's in Pharmacy and then enrolled as a Postgraduate candidate Pharmaceuticals. Later I completed my Master's for almost a decade. I spent my time learning, testing and exploring my abilities. The professors taught me patience, vigilance and always aspired me to become better.



After completing the Master's, I decided to pursue my career in academics. I refuged to Meerut (a city in the western part of the Indian state of Uttar Pradesh. It is an ancient city with settlements dating back to the Indus Valley Civilisation) and joined a Pharmacy College as a teaching faculty. It was a whole new experience in a different city. My four years of teaching experience made me bold and more understanding.
